CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MINUTES  
MONDAY, JULY 23, 2018**

Pastor Tom Elbert Jr., Divine Savior Lutheran Church gave the invocation

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited

Council members present: Gloria Taft, Mike Hibbard Sr., Lisa Carter, Donna Burke, Stacey Cline and Bonnie Enlow

Mayor Hockenbury called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m.

Mayor Hockenbury asked for motion to dispense with reading of the 7/9/2018 regular meeting minutes. Donna Burke made motion. Lisa Carter 2<sup>nd</sup>. Motion carried 6-0.

Mayor Hockenbury asked for motion to approve 7/9/2018 regular meeting minutes as written. Stacey Cline made motion. Gloria Taft 2<sup>nd</sup>. Motion carried 6-0.

Mayor Hockenbury asked for motion to dispense with reading of the 7/11/2018 special meeting minutes. Lisa Carter made motion. Donna Burke 2<sup>nd</sup>. Motion carried 6-0.

Mayor Hockenbury asked for motion to approve 7/11/2018 special meeting minutes as written. Donna Burke made motion. Lisa Carter 2<sup>nd</sup>. Motion carried 6-0.

**Old Business:**

Mayor Hockenbury asked Public Works Foreman Tom LaFollette for an update on The Greens at Heritage Hill and the status of the Interlocal Agreement with the County to pave High School Drive. Tom LaFollette: Mago was to meet with Steve on pricing to do some work there and once we get that we're ready to go on our part, but it will be cheaper for everyone if we coordinate that. As far as High School Drive the drainage project has been completed. We've talked with the County and they are going to have their folks over there to do the work; Mago is going to get involved to do the milling so the City will be out the cost for milling and cost of the product; the County is basically going to do the labor. Lisa Carter: Did the pricing change any? Tom LaFollette: It came down \$1000-\$1500. The project is estimated at \$17,000 and risers are not that expensive. Mayor Hockenbury: Magistrate Dennis Mitchell presented us with an Interlocal Agreement that Walt has looked over and said looked good. Bonnie Enlow: Can you read that to us? City Attorney Walt Sholar read the Interlocal Agreement between the County and City for cooperation for the purpose of road improvement. Bonnie Enlow made motion to authorize the Mayor to sign the Agreement with the County with a limit of \$17,000. Donna Burke 2<sup>nd</sup>. Motion carried 6-0.

**Daryl Lee, Planning & Zoning Appointee:** No report.

**Duane Price, Board of Adjustments Appointee:** The Lakeview request for variance was denied.

**Sign in Speakers:**

**Gary Board, 248 Partridge Run, Shepherdsville:** Do you have any height restrictions for residences whether it be townhouses or apartments that are being built in an R-3 zone. I know the County does, but I don't know if the City does. Mayor Hockenbury: Call Brenda Weidekamp tomorrow; she will know.

Josh Cravens, Debra Lee, **Jill Wallace, Jerry Boyd, Eric Berman, Mike Offe, Joe Harris** from The Pointe spoke to the Mayor and Council about major flooding and drainage issues asking for help dealing with these issues. Mayor Hockenbury said he would help in any way he could. He asked Tom and Arthur to go to The Pointe and survey the problems to see if anything at all can be done.

**Department Head Reports:**

Community Planning & Development Director Faith Portman: Reminded everybody about the Farmer's Market on Saturday, July 28<sup>th</sup>, 8 a.m.-12:00 p.m., there will be ten vendors that will be there; and it will be held in the new parking lot.

**Council Comments:**

**Stacey Cline:** I want to thank Tom for patching some potholes that I turned in. Also, I'm not sure if you all are aware of this and I'm sure everybody is having this issue, but Bullitt County has gotten a grant working with Alley Cat. If you have having a feral cat issue there is a grant out there and it's free to all Bullitt County residents. You will reach out to Alley Cat, 502-634-8777. What they do is if you get in touch with Alley Cat they will give you traps; you'll trap the cat, take it to them, they will do a spay or neuter for free, they will put FrontLine on your cat for treatment and vaccinate. You'll go the next day and pick the cat up and release it back out and in the following three days you take the traps back to Alley Cat. This is a huge thing for Bullitt County because we've had a lot of cat issues. I've trapped eight cats in two days and I'm taking them tonight to the snip clinic. They will offer this service until the grant runs out so take advantage of it. All you have to do is call them.

Bonnie Enlow: Tom, Boardwalk Apartments, the road that goes through there, is that owned by the Apartment? Tom LaFollette: It is. Bonnie Enlow: That road is horrible. School buses drive through there so I'm quite concerned how bad that road is. But I guess there is nothing we can do about it. Mayor Hockenbury: We can contract the people responsible like we did with the Sonic road and see if they will repair it. I'll reach out and tell them we've had some complaints on it.

Lisa Carter: I had several calls about the flooding in The Pointe yesterday. I have an issue with foxes. Will the Animal Control in Bullitt County address that? Mayor Hockenbury: No, they don't respond to anything but dogs and cats. Bonnie Enlow: You can trap them and take them to Second Chance in Mt. Washington. They take wild animals and they just ask that you give some kind of donation. They will take care of getting them where they need to be. City Attorney Sholar: Catching a wild fox? Lisa Carter: We have four there every day. They roam from Driftwood around to Cliffside to Fincastle. Tom Chamberlain: There was one this morning at the corner of Tollview and 44 by my restaurant; if you contact Fish and Wildlife they will send a

biologist out and they will try to rehome them. City Attorney Sholar: That is the right way to go because it's illegal to trap wild animals other than during the trapping season and/or you can hire somebody that has a permit. But if Fish and Wildlife will send someone that would be the way; but I would urge you not to go trapping them without getting the okay from Fish and Wildlife.

**Mike Hibbard Sr.:** A couple meetings ago we were given this memo from Republic that says they would like to put in a dumpster for recycling purposes. It said we have to cut the curb. Do you have a timeline on doing that? Mayor Hockenbury: Tom did you see where they want to cut the curb over by the Fire entrance. The Chief is not going to want that. You can come in and out of that entrance over there. Republic said they have had some requests for recycling and they could put a dumpster over here on this lot beside us just off the curb but you would have to cut the curb so they could come in and pick it up. Fire Chief Layne Troutman: It would be too dangerous. Lisa Carter: There is recycling down by the jail. Tom LaFollette: That's where I always refer anyone too. Mayor Hockenbury: He just gave the option; but I think the jail is okay. Donna Burke: Could we put it over by the Community Center next to Public Works? That would be a better location. Mayor Hockenbury: Tom, if you would tell Republic to put the recycling dumpster by the Community Center. Mike Hibbard: There was also a memo put out about odors in the Community Center. Any progress on that? Donna Burke: I spoke with Donna Meredith with Room in the Inn because I had an event there that night and they had gone over and mopped the floors that day and put out some air fresheners, so they definitely were doing something about the issue.

**Gloria Taft:** I had a couple calls about Carpenter and Joe B Hall flooding. It seems that this is flooding ever since the pink house has been demolished and the entity that bought that property filled in the drainage ditch next to the road. Tom LaFollette: We ran a camera through that last week and one of those tiles over there is researchable so there is some drainage currently right there. We've got some prices on getting it repaired. Gloria Taft: Sunday I got a call about the Park being closed at approximately 8:30 in the morning. I called Chief McCubbin and he said the officer that was supposed to unlock it made a run and then got over there as soon after. The same person sent me another picture this morning at about 8:47 and the Park was closed again. Tom's guys hadn't made it over there yet. Chief McCubbin said he spoke with you. The person chewed me out because before they left the Park was still locked up and the Public Works employee was at the Park used the restroom and left and did not unlock the Park. So I got an ear full this morning on why does the City handle business in this sort of way. Is there anything I can tell this person? Tom LaFollette: All I can say is they weren't over there using the restroom because they were with me. So I know that to be not factual. We were doing damage control at Joe B Hall, Adam Shepherd, Conestoga, Carpenter; we were no where near the Park. Gloria Taft: You weren't doing the Park because you were doing the flood evaluation. Got ya. Thank you.

Bonnie Enlow made motion to adjourn. Donna Burke 2<sup>nd</sup>. Motion carried 6-0. Meeting adjourned at 7:37 p.m.
